
A Year in the Life of STF: "Vote for the Planet" and "Human Rights on the Southern Border"



SEPTEMBER

STFers kicked off their "Vote for the Planet" Campaign with climate activist Sim Bilal. Sim motivated students to "Disrupt the System" by demanding change during a week of collective action to recognize National Voter Registration Day and the 2022 Global Climate Strike.



OCTOBER

At HRW's Annual Voices for Justice Dinner in Los Angeles, STF members engaged dinner guests in conversations about the upcoming midterm election ballot, environmental justice concerns and their recent advocacy successes. Dinner guests signed pledges to vote for the planet in November.





NOVEMBER

STF held mock elections, interactive tent events and class presentations to get out the vote before the 2022 midterm elections. STF members educated their peers on candidates running for local and federal positions, as well as on ballot measures to help them make informed decisions.

DECEMBER

STF chapters created visual displays, organized Kahoot games, conducted schoolwide surveys to evaluate their campus' human rights climate and filmed original PSAs to educate their peers on the importance of human rights. STF members made sure human rights remained front



At the first-ever hybrid STF Winter Leadership Workshop, Vicki Gaubeca and Ari Sawyer from HRW's U.S. Program introduced STF members to the humanitarian crisis facing asylum seekers along the U.S.-Mexico border. In breakout groups, attendees discussed human rights violated by U.S. border policies and identified ways to educate and engage their school communities in advocacy against deadly deterrence policies in the U.S. immigration system.



APRIL

STFers continued to immerse their classmates in the fight to protect the human right to seek asylum through interactive classroom presentations and oncampus events.



MARCH

STF members screened the documentary "The Real Death Valley" and classmates signed petitions urging their Congressional representatives to condemn deadly deterrence policies. The film follows the 40-mile trek through the sweltering brush that has taken the lives of hundreds of migrants attempting to evade border patrol checkpoints in Brooks County, Texas.



Experiential tent events simulated the journey asylum seekers make from South America to the U.S.-Mexico border. The exhibit demonstrated the challenges asylum seekers face when they flee their countries of origin, make the journey to the U.S. and apply for asylum at the southern border. Participants signed petitions demanding their congressmembers stop the use of deadly deterrence policies.

Disrupting The System

for you to advocate on an issue, you can knock these people flat down," Sim Bilal, 20-year-old climate activist from South L.A., said to participants at the launch of the Human Rights Watch Student Task Force (STF) "Vote for the Planet" campaign. The theme of disruption ran throughout the academic year as students pre-registered voters, met with school board representatives and began demanding Congress create a more humane asylum system in the spring "Human Rights on the Southern Border" campaign. Advocacy higlights include:

Vote for the Planet:

- Santa Monica HS STFers successfully petitioned the SMMUSD School Board to commit to transition its school to 100% renewable energy sources through the Clean Power Alliance.
- STFers at Wayne Hills HS in New Jersey presented plans to their Board of Education's Facilities division to transition their district to 100% renewable energy.
- Registered and preregistered hundreds of voters.
 More than 1,000 students participated in mock
- elections ahead of the 2022 midterm elections.

Human Rights on the Southern Border:

- Engaged thousands of students in interactive tent exhibits, film screenings and tabling events.
- Collected over 1,200 petition signatures in an ongoing effort to urge their local congressional representatives to condemn deadly deterrence policies that endanger the lives of vulnerable asylum seekers at the U.S. southern border.
- Drafted and posted public comments on Biden's expanded asylum transit ban explaining the human rights violating consequences of the new policy.

The Human Rights Watch Student Task Force, launched in 1999, is a youth leadership-training program that brings together high school students and educators and empowers them to advocate for human rights issues, especially the rights of children.
